Do *not* summarize the plot or the characters. Minimum 500 words. Reports should be submitted in word-processing files to the Beachboard Turnitin Dropbox for that unit under "Assignments". Use either Word, Wordperfect, or RTF (rich-text-format) to be accepted by Turnitin.

Instructions for case studies:

Read the entire case study, paying special attention to the philosophical issues and dilemmas in that unit of the course. Write an essay discussing these issues and answering the designated question for that case study. Minimum 500 words. Reports should be submitted in word-processing files to the Beachboard Turnitin Dropbox for that unit under "Assignments". Use either Word, Wordperfect, or RTF (rich-text-format) to be accepted by Turnitin. In order to receive credit for this course, every student must complete *three* of the Film Reports or Case Study reports. This meets the writing requirement for the General Education certification for this course. These are due at the deadlines noted above. Late assignments will be accepted for points *only* if you meet the University excused absence policy (see "Course Requirements and Grading"). If, at the end of the course, you have not completed the three required writing assignments, those may be turned in no later than Friday, December 10, but you will not receive any points toward your course grade for late reports. If you do not submit the writing assignments by December 10, your course grade will be an Incomplete; you will have one year to complete the writing; if you do not complete the writing after one year, it will convert to an F.
