- **Dialects:** None known. Fingerspelling system similar to French Sign Language [[fsl](#)].
- **Typology:** One-handed fingerspelling (Greek script).
- **Language Use:** School. Deaf associations. 12,000 children and 30,000 active adult users (1996).
- **Language Development:** New media. Theater. Films. TV. Dictionary.
- **Other Comments:** 40 working sign language interpreters (2014 EUD). Many L2 users. L2 teaching materials available. Christian (Orthodox)."
