JUDICIAL CITATIONS:

State v. Outing, 3 A.3d 1 (Conn. 2010).

Three concurring justices of the Connecticut Supreme Court cited research in support of their argument that their decision in *State v. Kemp*, 507 A.2d 1387 (1986) (concluding that expert testimony on the fallibility of eyewitness identifications is unnecessary and, therefore, inadmissible because it is a subject within the ken of the average juror) should be overruled.

Wilson v. Gaetz, 608 F.3d 347 (7th Cir. 2010).

When writing on behalf of a federal appellate court panel, noted jurist and scholar Judge Richard Posner cited the arguments I made as a critic of the "guilty but mentally ill" verdict in support of a finding that an attorney performed deficiently in presenting an insanity defense in murder trial, thereby supporting a Sixth Amendment ineffective assistance of counsel claim.

United States v. Smith, 621 F. Supp.2d 1207 (M.D. Ala. 2009).

Relying on my scholarship, this federal district court ruled that expert testimony regarding the unreliability of eyewitness identifications was admissible.

State v. Clopten, 223 P.3d 1103 (Utah 2009).

Citing my scholarship for the proposition that the inclusion of expert testimony regarding eyewitness identification carries significant advantages over the alternatives, namely cross-examination and jury instructions, the Utah Supreme Court ruled that trial courts in the state commit prejudicial error by excluding eyewitness expert testimony.

Ferensic v. Birkett, 451 F. Supp. 2d 874 (E.D. Mich. 2006).

Relying on my scholarship, this federal district court granted a *habeas corpus* petition on the basis that a prisoner was deprived of a substantial defense by exclusion of defense witness and expert witness of eyewitness identifications.

United States v. Thomas, 2006 WL 140558 (D. Md. 2006).

Relying on my scholarship, the federal court ruled that proffered behavioral science expert testimony should be excluded as unreliable under the *Daubert* test.
