 - J. Types of Assignments**

A. Final exam

The exam will consist of multiple choice, true/false, and essay questions. **No make-up exams** are permitted without prior arrangement with the instructor.

B. Quizzes

Following each unit in the text, there will be a short quiz at the beginning of the next class period. These quizzes will consist of true/false, multiple choice, and fill in the blank questions. Each quiz will begin at five minutes after the hour and end at 10 minutes after the hour. If you arrive later than 10 minutes after the hour, you will NOT be allowed to make up the quiz.

C Skills Test

The student will demonstrate basic soccer (dribbling, shooting, and passing) skills.

D. Participation

Each class is worth 2.5 points. If you come to class on time and participate to the best of your capability, you will receive 2.5 points for the day. If, in the opinion of the instructor, you do not participate to your best you will not earn full credit for the day. (Just because you are physically present does not mean you automatically earn the points for the day.) If you come into class later than 5 minutes after the hour, you will only earn a maximum of .5 points for the day. If you cannot participate for medical reasons, you **MUST provide a doctors note to verify the problem within 48 hours of the missed class. Failure to do so will result in the student not receiving credit for the missed class(s).**

Regular attendance and participation: You will be allowed one absence without affecting your grade. Five points will be deducted for each absence after the first.

M. Instructor’s Interpretation of the University’s Withdrawal Policy as it will be applied to this particular course

It is the student’s responsibility to withdraw from classes. Instructors have no obligation to withdraw students who do not attend courses, and may choose not to do so.
