
The undersigned requests a review of the rights and duties pursuant to:

mathematically inclusive, that is, are exactly six units sufficient.

REJECTION OF REQUEST FOR DECLATORY JUDGMENT

Plaintiff: Duncan Brown

In rejecting this case the court holds that there is no case in controversy. A.S. Bylaws, Chapter II, Article VI, Section 9, Para. A-1, A-2, C-1, C-2, C-5, stipulate the requirements for A.S. elective and appointive officers to include that a prospective officer must have completed "more than six units", and be enrolled in "more than six units". The court interprets this statement quite literally to mean that while any recognized college credit over six units is sufficient to qualify an individual for office, six units or less is not.

It is so ordered.




