ACUI Ventures to San Diego

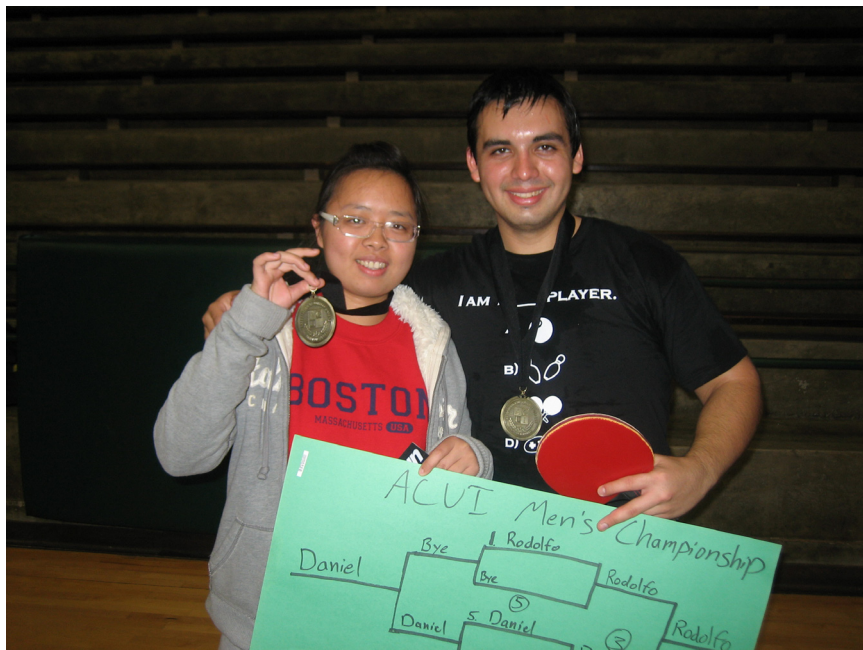
