Update

3700 new CalGrant Awards in CA (200-300 expected for CSULB)

Fee Paying Financial Aid Awards

- State University Grant (CA Residents)
- Cal Grant A or B (18,000 students)
- Total \$52 million (Fall), 55% of our undergraduate student' fees are covered in full, a 3% increase over the past three years
- 33% of Credential Graduate Students received Cal Grant A or B (about \$6 million) steady over the past three years

Awards for Living Expenses (Students may qualify for 1-3)

- Federal Pell Grant (about 50% of our students are receiving)
- Cal Grant Stipend (State Funded)
- SEOG (for Pell Grant Students)
- EOP Grant
- Unduplicated total: 17,568 unique students/\$52 million/52.48% (avg. award \$2900)
- Limited funds for graduate students
- Total dollars consistent over the past three years with an increase in the avg. award (about \$100 higher) with slightly fewer students receiving grants

Student Borrowing

- Compared to national averages, our students are borrowing less frequently and in fewer amounts with Pandemic drops over the past three years: about 8% less borrowing than in 2019
- Subsidized (18% of undergraduate students) & Unsubsidized Loans (15% of undergraduate students--with options to pre-pay the interest)
- Graduate students are only eligible for unsubsidized loans (since 2014)

From Heather, does this impact 4+1 degrees (when a masters degree is integrated into the overall experience)?

They are classified as undergraduates during the first four years. During the fifth year, they would lose access.

From Heather, one of the Beach 2030 goals is to increase graduate enrollment. Are the borrower profiles stateside and CPIE comparable?

Stateside programs are funded through our campus budget. Our soft-support students are borrowing at a higher rate than our stateside students. Stateside students pay subsidized costs, whereas CPIE students pay the full costs.

From Dave, are the living expense grants available to CPIE students at the undergraduate level?

Yes, the Federal Pell Grant and Cal Grants are available, but the EOP grant is not. However, a much lower percentage of CPIE students would qualify due to the fact that many are income earners.
