“Your Right to Know”

DATE: February 11, 2018

Sexual Battery

In compliance with the federal *Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1998*, we are issuing this “Timely Warning Notice” to report an act of violence occurring in our campus community:

On February 11, 2018 at about 9:45 am a male student was seated on the lawn in the area of the Beach Side complex. An unknown male suspect approached the male student and sat down next to him. The suspect put his arm around the victim. The victim became uncomfortable and got up and left the area. The suspect followed the victim into the Beachside complex and into the building. Once inside the building the suspect followed the victim up stairs and grabbed the victim’s genitals while on the stairs. The suspect then left the building and out of sight. He is described as:

- A white male mid-to late twenties, short light brown hair, blue eyes, 6’ 160 lbs. wearing a dark colored shirt and blue jean pants.

Reduce Your Risk

- If you encounter this subject call University Police
- Stay Alert, tuned-in to your surroundings
- If approached by an unknown subject and it is safe to do so, take a picture of the subject with a cell phone
- Do Not let strangers into a building!
- Walk in well-lit areas; stay away from alleys
- Avoid walking alone and use the Community Service Officer Program for Escorts or the buddy system
- If harassed or assaulted, scream for help and run to safety
- Call University Police at (562)985-4101 if you see any suspicious activity or people and 911 for emergencies
