



Panhe was an ancient Acjachemen Village nestled on the banks of San Mateo Creek. This Large prosperous village was major source of the labor that made the construction of Mission San Juan Capistrano Possible. Ancestors recovered throughout Orange County have been respectfully reburied here. This site is **threatened** by a new toll road extension.



Putiidhem in San Juan Capistrano, is the "mother village " of the Acjachemen people. The site contains human remains and dense artifact concentrations documenting long periods of occupations, as far back as 2 to 3 thousand years ago.



The Harbor Cove homes sits on an ancient population center. Over 600 ancestors were removed from the bluff. The remains were over 9,000 years old- as old as the Pyramids of Egypt.



12:00-#4- Gather in the parking lot & walk to the -Bolsa Chica Mesa Pt. Memorial Garden, established by environmental activists as well as Native Americans. Home of the mysterious Cog Stones.  
1:30-#5- This area was occupied for over 6,000 years by Tongva/ Acjachemen Ancestors and is being considered by the National Registry of Historic Places for its cultural and scientific value.



Pray where Native American monitors stood in a circle to protect resting Ancestors. We visit the memorial gardens/walk and pray at the reburial site.



Welcome as we gather at the place of origin, the place of creation, a place of gathering. This site, sacred to Tongva, Acjachemen and other tribes is located on Cal State Long Beach campus. It is listed on the National Registry of Historic places. Native people and supporters have untied and are working with the University to continue protecting this unique and precious place.
