However, one exhibit attracted the program's love of art and learning – Miyoshi Barosh: The End. This exhibit featured mixed media pieces from the artist diagnosed with uterine cancer. The influential works have profound meaning about illness, grief, and being human while reflecting on lessons highlighted in our program. Barosh's work featured diverse artistic materials, including yarn, glass, and even steel, to create a pop art collection with bold colors and textures.

Although the commanding artwork initially drew the program to the museum, it was not the only occasion. During the mixer, alumni and current students chatted, caught up on the past few years, and shared program stories. Although for some, it has been years since seeing each other, it felt as if no time had passed while new friendships formed. The museum also hosts Thursday night Make and Take events, which the program eagerly partook in. Creating personal artwork crafts, appreciating meaningful pieces, and spending time with program friends led to one excellent night at the museum.

Over the years, and as we have grown our servIces beyond the Villages at Cabrillo and across the city of Long Beach, we have observed that as an individual ages in place in supportive housing, the level of services they may receive more often than not doesn't adjust to meet their changing needs due to lack of funding for those services and/or due to a lack of a robust network of support to help identify new needs.

In order to help address this specific issue, we are thrilled to have partnered with the Long Beach State University's Gerontology Program to work with students from Alexandra Wilkinson's classes. This fall, we had the pleasure of working with a group of students from this program who volunteered 20 service learning hours exploring this area exclusively at the Villages at Cabrillo with us.

They designed a survey for both the senior residents and for the staff on the site who provide direct services to those senior residents. The objective of this was to help identify specific gaps in services for senior residents and to identify areas where services staff need additional support to better serve their senior residents.

It was a wonderful experience to work with these students in this initial phase of exploration of this need area, and we are so grateful to them for their time and hard work. We are also beyond grateful for the support from Alexandra Wilkinson in partnering with us in this way to help our community better understand the needs of senior residents in supportive housing so that those needs can be adequately addressed.

We look forward to the opportunity to continue working with this program in this way to build on the initial research conducted this fall semester, and we welcome all students interested in working with us to reach out by email to love@ourcityheart.org.

Cognitive health stable or improved




Agility and balance improved

- Dr. Claver is doing a project with the Nursing Faculty to explore how Student Health Services can best serve students of all ages. Phase 1 examined older students' use of CSULB Student Health Services. Phase 2 (currently in progress) involves comparing older students' (age 50 and older), non-traditional students' (age 25-49) and traditional students' (age 24 and younger) use of Student Health Services. Phase 3 involves surveying older students and non-traditional students about their awareness about, use of, and opinions about Student Health Services.

Attending the CA Assisted Living Association Conference






INTERNING @ HEART OF IDA JOCELYN ESPINOZA, GERN MINOR



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The California Council on Gerontology and Geriatrics (CCGG) promotes the quality of life of California's diverse aging population through leadership and by fostering statewide collaborations among educational programs, providers, practitioners and public policy advocates in the field of aging.

President Maria Claver along with several CSULB faculty members serve on the CCGG board and are proud to report another eventful year offering opportunities for education, networking, and advocacy. Members have recently been treated to topical webinars featuring expert speakers on housing options, hearing protection, medical cannabis, HIV/AIDS, and a panel highlighting distinct careers in aging.

Recently, CCGG included their first student-focused workshop offering tips for choosing a thesis topic and brainstorming with industry professionals. A successful Spring workshop introduced members to recent research and projects. The "best in show" award went to CSULB alumna Sofia Hodjat for Logistics of Loss, a manual offering practical step-by-step guidance for the bereaved which she has since published.

CCGG has also been actively involved with non-profits and industry partners seeking to raise wages for caregivers working in skilled nursing facilities to \$20 an hour and to support legislative proposals for the inclusion of "undue influence" in elder abuse law. Going back to basics, CCGG members in Sacramento spearheaded a committee to define terms such as "gerontology" and "gerontologist" once and for all. Their carefully crafted language will illuminate the CCGG website – and the world – in 2023.
