Jennifer Ureno: I will be doing a dietetic internship program at Cal Poly Pomona.




Service Learning



The purpose of the Get Social Workshop was to encourage older adults to socialize with others and promote social health. This allowed me to gain more clarity on it as we have talked about how social health can affect older adults in Gerontology 400. The Healthy Brain Workshop aims to promote healthy brain function. This workshop was important as the brain aids in your ability to communicate, make decisions, problem-solve, and more. Keeping an active brain can help to make it adaptable and assist in mental functions, which can be affected as taught in Gerontology 400.

Connected to Lead also put us into contact with Alzheimers LA, which was great for me as a Speech-Language Pathology major. In the last few months, CCGG has hosted several webinars and a research showcase. The California Council on Gerontology and Geriatrics (CCGG) promotes the quality of life of California's diverse aging population through leadership and by fostering statewide collaborations among educational programs, providers, practitioners and public policy advocates in the field of aging.

Maria Claver presented two workshops, "The Blue Zones" and "Sleep Hygiene" to residents at Vivante on the Coast assisted living community as part of their Vitality Program.
