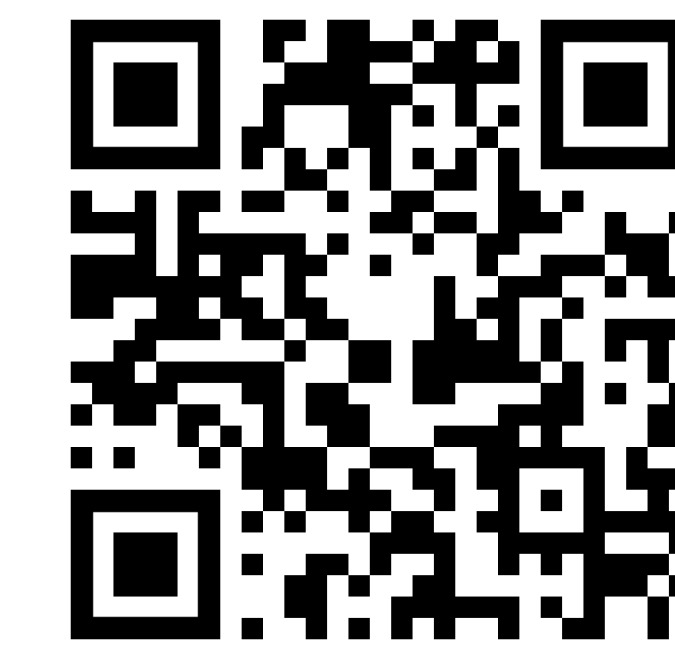




Examining Access & Retention of the Long Beach College Promise from a Racial Equity Lens

Introduction

Launched in 2008, the Long Beach College Promise (**The Promise**) aims to fulfill the academic potential of all youth by offering guidance and continuous support along every step of the student experience, from pre-K through college and onto career and life.

Goals

- Increase the percentage of LBUSD students who are prepared for and attend college directly from high school;
- Increase the percentage of LBCC students who earn degrees and/or career technical certificates;
- Increase the percentage of LBCC students who successfully transfer to CSULB or another four-year college or university; and
- Increase the percentage of CSULB students who graduate with a bachelor's degree and/or advanced degrees.

Methods

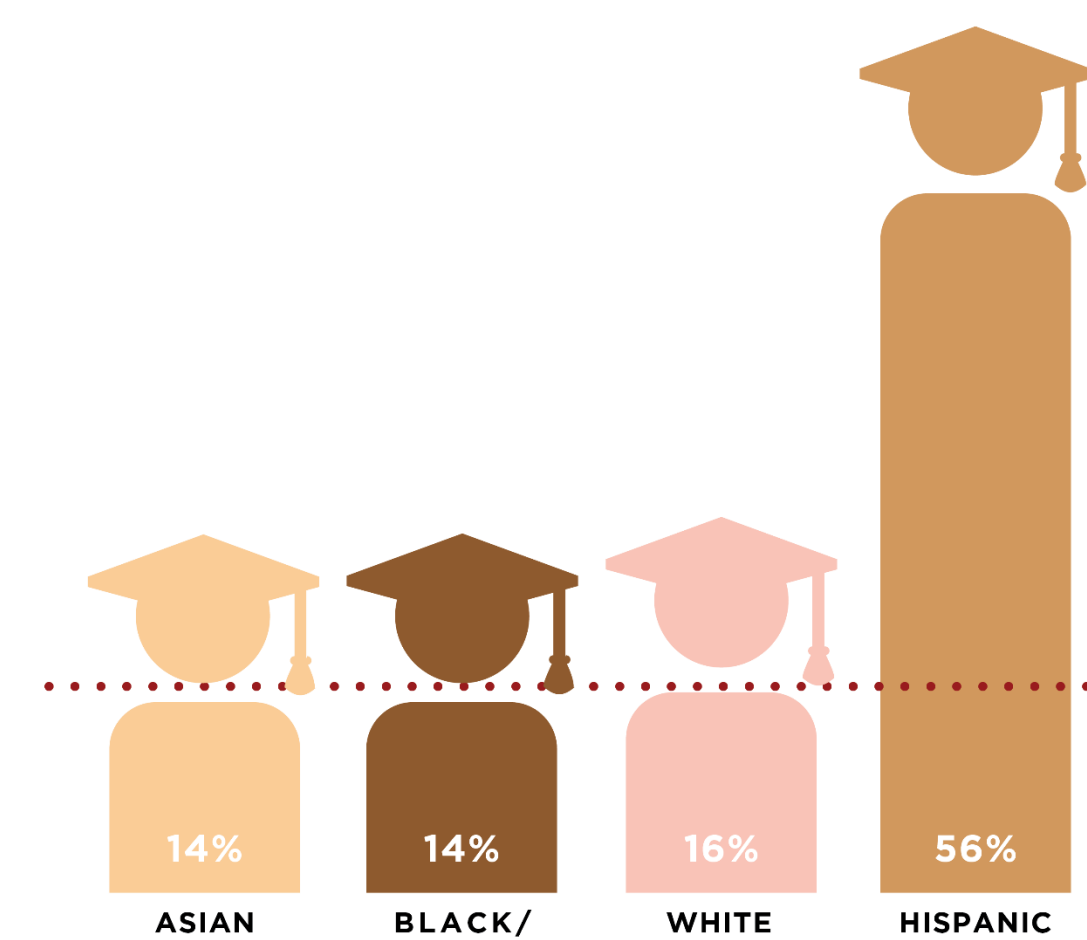

Conducted focus group with LBUSD high school students

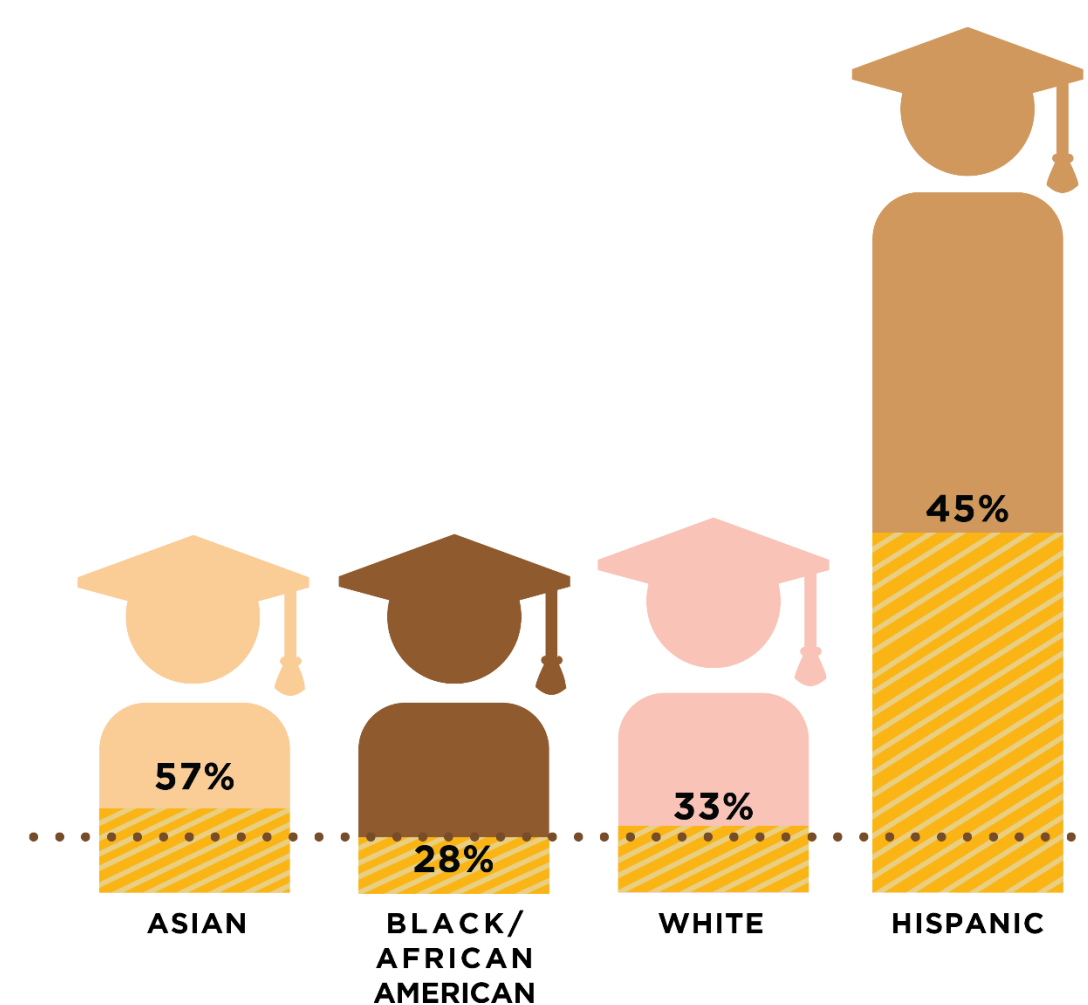
Conducted survey/interviews with LBUSD Administrators, College Advisors, and Counselors

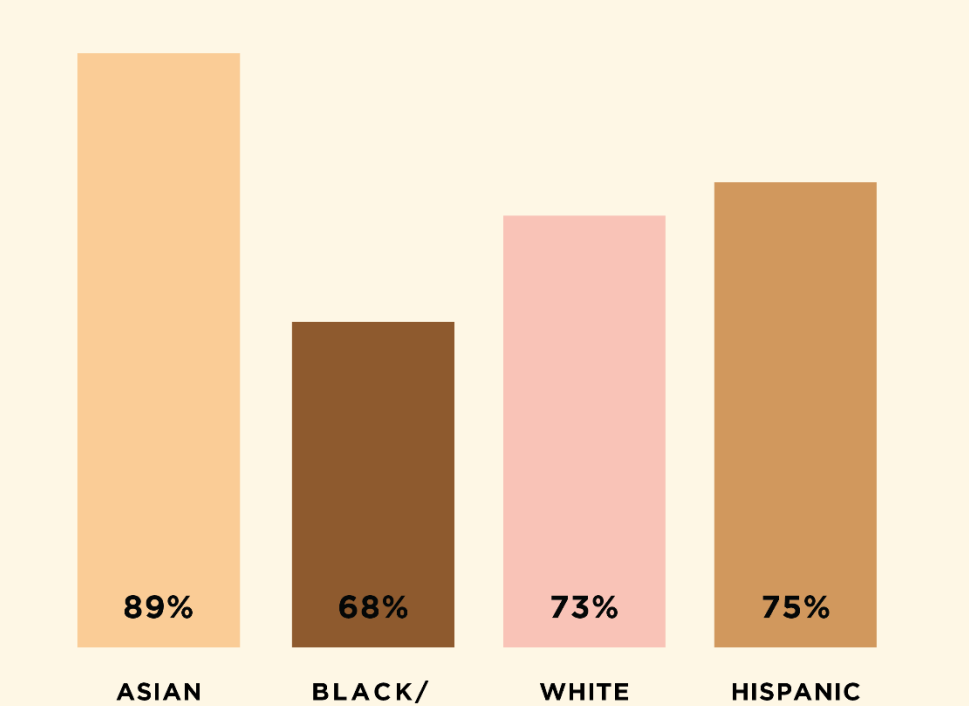
ETHNICITY RATIO OF LBUSD HS GRADUATES IN THE LAST 5 YEARS



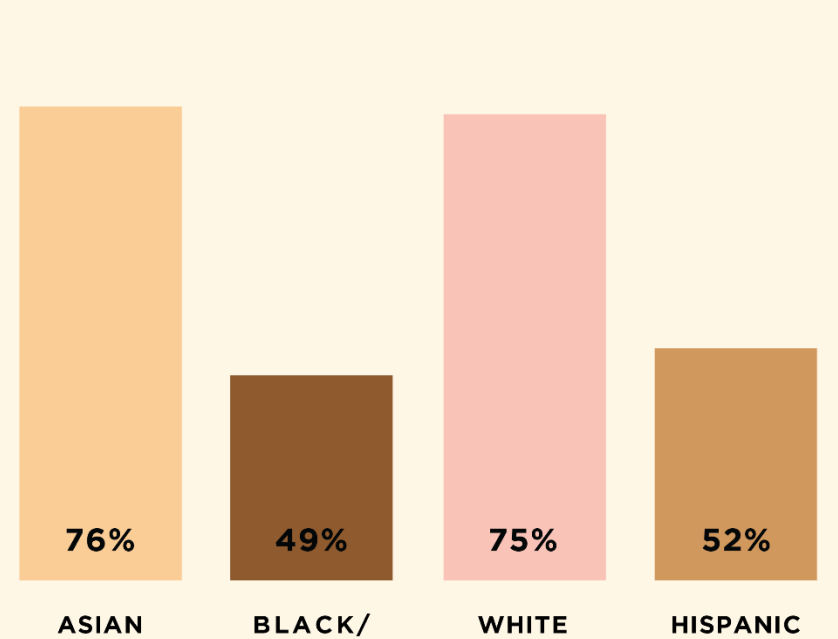
LBUSD HS GRADUATES APPLIED TO CSULB



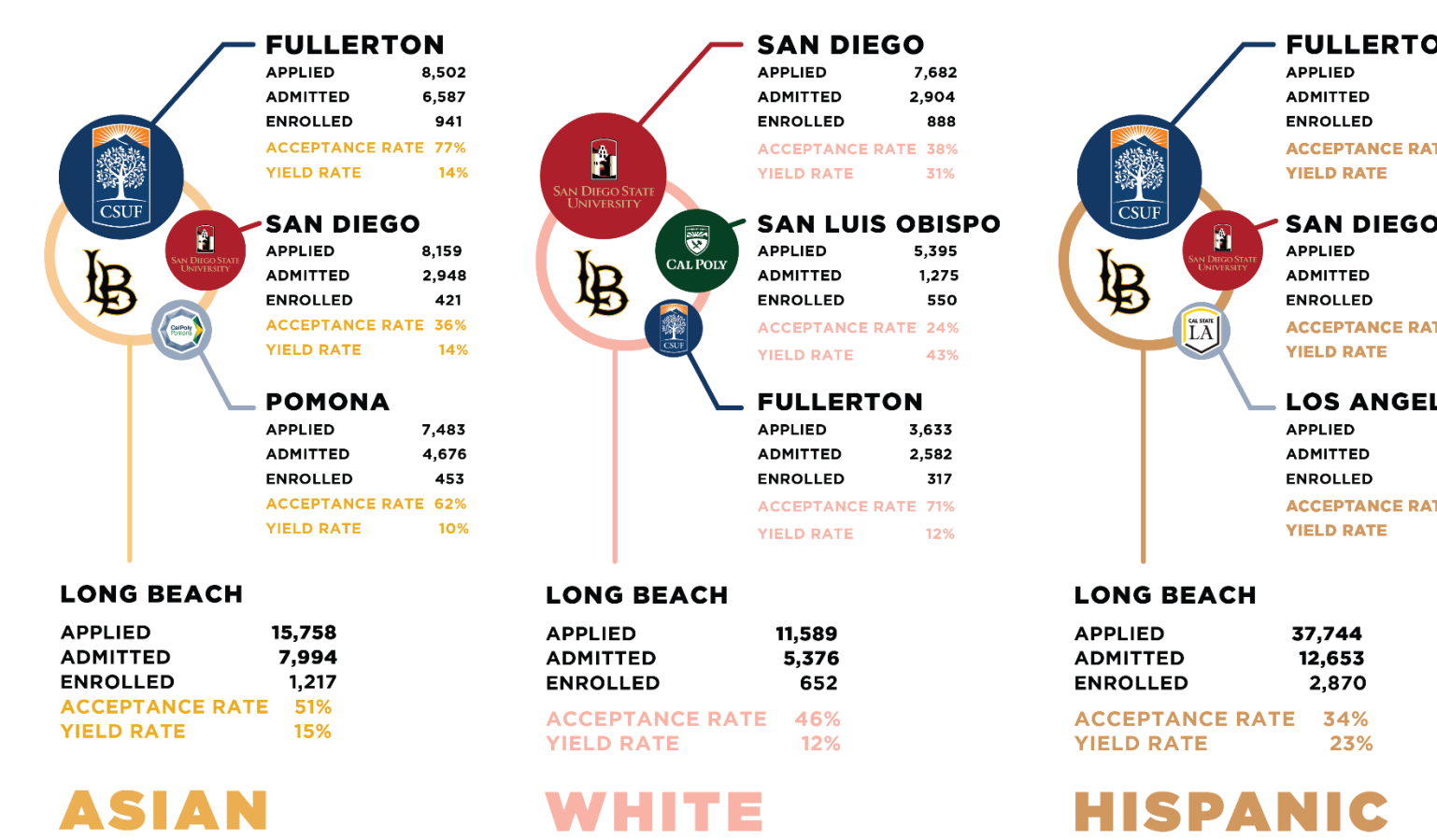
LBUSD HS GRADUATES ADMITTED RATE TO CSULB

STUDENT FOCUS GROUP THEMES

"I FEEL LIKE...WHAT IT REALLY ENTAILS STILL LIKE A LITTLE BIT **CONFUSED** LIKE THE SPECIFIC DETAILS OF IT, BUT UM YEAR THAT'S IT I KIND OF KNOWN ABOUT IT."

"FOR ME, I FEEL LIKE IF COLLEGES DON'T GIVE ME ENOUGH **FINANCIAL AID** THEN I WILL DEFINITELY GO TO A CITY COLLEGE AND FINISH MY TWO YEARS, THEN TRANSFER TO ANOTHER FOUR YEAR UNIVERSITY."

"...WHEN I DECIDED TO WHERE TO APPLY AND THEN MAKING THAT DECISION, LIKE THE **MAJOR** ...IF THEY HAD NEUROSCIENCE IS A **BIG DEAL TO ME**, SO I THINK THAT WAS ONE OF THE MOST SIGNIFICANT THINGS WHEN I APPLIED..."

Conclusion / Discussion

LBUSD High School Graduates Results

- For the last 5 years, Asian, Black, and White LBUSD high school students had **similar populations**;
- However, the **Black students were the least to apply** to CSULB and also had the **lowest acceptance rate** among all other ethnicities.
- The acceptance rate results are close in matching with the levels of **students meeting UC/CSU requirements**.

Focus Group Results

- Most students do not think they know much about The Program.
- The most important factor for the students is the financial support from institutions.

Survey/Interviews Results

- Mainly, administrators/college advisors/counselors know mostly about the 2-year free tuition benefit of The Program.
- They also understand about the benefit that students from LBUSD are admitted to CSULB based on minimum CSULB requirements.
- They stated that they need more information and materials about The Program in order to educate students and for student to understand The Program better.

Implications for Action

- Miscommunications among administrators, high school counselors, and students about The Program.
- They need more information and materials.
- **"Access is not Affordability"** this is a major theme. Just because students have a pathway to CSULB, it does not make it an option for them to attend CSULB. This could be why the 2-year free tuition aspect of The Program is the benefit that stands out to students and counselors.

Next Steps / Future Directions

- Discuss with CSULB Long Beach College Promise department to provide scholarships/financial aid programs exclusively for CSULB Promise students
- Dissect types of materials counselors requested for short-term and long-term needs to provide information to their students.
- Ensure LBUSD students are receiving a presentation for the Long Beach College Promise program in the school year.
- Survey LBUSD parents about The Promise and their views on sending their students to CSULB.
- Research and identify equity roadblocks that Promise students facing while they're attending CSULB.
