

# LONG BEACH COMMUNITY INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The Long Beach Community Internship Program establishes collaborations with Long Beach nonprofits and city departments to close the loop on the Long Beach Promise, creating a bridge for students back to their communities to work, live and thrive. LBCIP increases the number of CSULB students who complete paid internships and provides opportunities for students to do meaningful work in their own neighborhoods, while they apply coursework to real world settings, hone professional skills, network, and explore local career opportunities.

## PROGRAM SPECIFICS

Students participating in the Long Beach Community Internship Program:

- » Complete a minimum of 90 hours of work with a Long Beach nonprofit or City Department
- » Enroll in parallel internship courses that provide professional development and coaching
- » Participate in program workshops and trainings
- » Receive \$1,500 participation awards
