



YOUR TRANSFER SUCCESS

What is a Transfer Student?

You are a transfer applicant if you have completed coursework at a college or university since leaving high school, but have not yet completed a bachelor's degree. CSULB accepts applications from upper-division transfer students each semester.

Fall Semester Admission	October 1 through November 30
Spring Semester Admission	August 1 through August 31



Transfer Student Requirements:

- Complete 60 transferable semester units or 90 transferable quarter units.
- Complete with a grade of a "C" or better the CSU General Education (GE) requirements in Written Communication, Oral Communication, Critical Thinking and Mathematics/Quantitative Reasoning.
- Complete a minimum of 30 semester units or 45 quarter units in courses approved to meet CSU GE requirements.
- Have a minimum, overall college GPA of 2.0 or higher in all transferable college coursework attempted.
- Be in good standing at the last college or university attended.
- Admission to all majors at CSULB is competitive and continues to have more qualified applicants than space available.
- All transfer students must declare a major when submitting their application.
- CSULB is closed to lower-division transfer applicants with the exception of a limited number of highlyqualified Nursing students.

It is essential for transfer students to have a minimum GPA of 2.0. GPAs are determined by dividing the total number of units attempted into the total number of grade points awarded. CSULB does not include +/- points if another school shows them on their transcripts.

PATHWAYS TO CSULB

There are **two** possible pathways you can follow to demonstrate preparation in your intended major: Major-Specific Requirements and Associate Degree for Transfer Program (ADT). Review the information below to determine which option is best for you.

Option 1: MAJOR-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

These requirements reflect the lower-division major preparation recommended by the CSULB department faculty.

STEP 1 - Review the Major-Specific Requirements listed for the colleges below. Each CSULB major has specific requirements. The criteria will be used for Fall 2023 and Spring 2024 admission consideration and is subject to change for future admission cycles.

Major-Specific

The example used throughout this guide is a BS in Psychology (College of Liberal Arts).

STEP 2 - Use <u>ASSIST.org</u> to determine equivalent courses between CSULB and California community colleges that will satisfy specific course requirements.

- Refer to CSULB Major-Specific Requirements to see which courses to complete at your community college.
- Search by department not by major to ensure you are getting the correct course equivalents.
- Recommended courses are not required to be completed at your community college, but may make you a stronger candidate.



STEP 3 - Using the Articulation Agreement and Major-Specific Requirements identify the equivalent courses at your local community college. **Only** complete the Major-Specific Requirement courses found on the CSULB page.



Option 2: ASSOCIATE DEGREE FOR TRANSFER PROGRAM (ADT)

For the ADT admission process, you must meet the following criteria:

- Pursue an approved ADT at a California community college. The ADT is different from other Associate degrees offered by the California Community Colleges.
- Not all majors at CSULB have a corresponding ADT at every California community college.
 Be sure you are pursuing a degree that has been deemed similar to your intended major at CSULB.
- Applicants must indicate on their <u>Cal State Apply</u> application their intent to transfer with an ADT. The ADT option can not be added after the application has been submitted.
- The community college must **certify** that you are on track to complete the ADT prior to the term you are applying to enter CSULB.

Fall Semester Application	All admission requirements must be met and the ADT must be granted no later than the prior Spring term
Spring Semester Application	All admission requirements must be met and the ADT must be granted no later than the prior Summer term

If for any reason you **do not** complete your ADT, your admission status will be re-evaluated and we may withdraw your offer of admission.

• Under current CSU guidelines, **your cumulative grade point average (GPA) will be increased by 0.1**, and this "calculated GPA" will be applied to the major-specific minimum GPA and to any GPA used in the ranking of applicants.

Note: Even with the benefits of the ADT, admission into the university is still very competitive.

It is advised that students complete any recommended coursework listed for their major to be more competitive in the applicant pool. It is possible that CSULB may not have space available to accommodate all ADT applicants, and your application may be directed to another CSU campus.

- Contact your community college transfer center for more information on meeting the requirements for ADT.
