# CENTER FOR SUCCESSFUL AGING ANNUAL REPORT 2022 - 2023

By 2050, the number of older adults will surpass the number of children, with the population 65 and older estimated to reach 1.6 billion persons globally. Aging is both a local and a global phenomenon. The older adult population in Southern California is quite diverse and is expected grow over 150% between 2010-2060 with the oldest old (85 and older) growing over 400%!

We can approach aging not only as an exciting challenge, but as an opportunity to create innovative solutions. At the Center for Successful Aging, we are working to give students opportunities to acquire the skills needed to serve an aging population, as well as engaging in research that will improve quality of life for older adults and their families in Long Beach and beyond. 
