INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The Long Beach Community Internship Program (LBCIP) establishes collaborations with Long Beach nonprofits, small businesses, and city departments to create a bridge for students back to their communities to work, live, and thrive. LBCIP increases the number of CSULB students who complete paid internships while providing opportunities for students to do meaningful work in their own neighborhoods, while they apply coursework to real world settings, hone professional skills, network, and explore local career options.

PROGRAM SPECIFICS

Students participating in the Long Beach Community Internship Program:

- >> Complete a minimum of 90 hours of work with Long Beach nonprofits, small businesses, and city departments
- Enroll in parallel internship courses that provide professional development and coaching
- Participate in program workshops and trainings
- Receive \$2,000 participation awards

OUR STUDENTS

- 100% graduated from a Long Beach high school or are currently living in the local area and consider Long Beach home
 - 95% are students of color
 - **80%** are first in their families to earn a college degree

OUR IMPACT

- 100% of students report benefits to participating in the program including increased confidence and the opportunity to network while giving back to the local community.
 - of students receive job offers from their internship sites or by referral following completion of their internship placements.
 - 40% of participating nonprofit organizations partner with CSULB for the fist time by hosting LBCIP interns.





POST-INTERNSHIP SURVEYS

To better understand how participating in the Long Beach Community Internship Program benefits students and to identify ways to improve the program, students complete post-internship online surveys. Survey results for the spring 2024 cohort reveal that students experienced both personal and professional growth as a result of completing their internships.

97%

- rated their internships as either good or excellent.
- noted that they acquired job or work-related skills at their internship sites and had the opportunity to engage with diverse people and ideas.
- reported an increase in self-confidence and a desire to further engage in community service.

86%

- noted that they were able to apply course knowledge to real-world situations at their internship sites.
- reported a better understanding of their strengths and weaknesses at the completion of their internships.
