2024-2025 MOOT COURT Season in Review: A Third Title in Five Years

Rebuilding:

This was the dawn of the 7th generation of mooters since I have been coaching. Put another way, 2024-2025 was a rebuilding year. CSULB returned three advocates from a phenomenal 2023-2024 squad of six teams that earned six bids to nationals. "6 for 6" we called it. The only time every CSULB has earned a bid to nationals. A repeat was unlikely to happen. That said, we held our own bid-wise – and more.

Oral Advocacy:

Top 5% in the nation for the 18th straight season

Invitationals and Scrimmages:

CSULB competed in three invitationals. We put six teams into semi-finals. We closed out the CSULB Fall Classic finishing 1-2-3-4 and placed teams in semis at Holy Cross and at Colorado Christian University (CCU). We won a lot of speaker awards at the Rocky Mountain Invitational – led by Emily Atherley (1st), Aiden Dauscher (2nd), Shakhzoda Khodjakhonova (3rd), Haritha Muthukumar (4th), Jordan Gebrian (7th), Kylie Barnhart (8th), and Katie Glaab (10th).

Regionals:

We had six teams in regionals — each reaching the sweet 16. We reached two semi-finals (Ivonne Sotelo and Kylie Barnhart at the Western and Emily Atherley and Haritha Muthukumar at the Eastern) and one quarter-finals (Kelly Bello and Maggie Cruz at the Eastern) and one quarter-finals (Kelly Bello and Maggie Cruz at the Golden Gate). CSULB won five top ten orator awards: Emily (4th in the Eastern), Maggie (4th at the Golden Gate), Kelly (5th at the Golden Gate), Haritha (7th in the Eastern), and Katie (8th at the Western Regional). We had eight students qualify for the Preliminary Round of the National Tournament (PRONT): Kelly and Maggie Cruz, Emily and Haritha, Ivonne and Kylie, and Shakhzoda and Jordan.

Nationals:

Three of our teams at the PRONTs advanced to the Sweet 16. Two teams dropped very close 2-1 decisions. One advanced to the semi-finals. That team of Kelly and Maggie qualified for the FRONT. For the season, they finished in the top 5% for oral advocacy in the nation.

Written Advocacy:

The 7th Generation wins its first national title. Ivonne and Kylie won the AMCA National Championship for Petitioner Written Advocacy. The 7th Generation became the fourth straight



generation to bring an AMCA trophy back to campus for the school and the first to do so in its first season. This is CSULB's fourth title for written advocacy (2004, 2014, 2021, and 2025) and sixth title overall (CSULB won the oral advocacy crown in 2003 and 2022).

In summary, CSULB earned three written brief awards — only the 2022-23 squad won more. In addition to Ivonne and Kylie, Shakhzoda and Jordan finished 4th in Petitioner Advocacy, while Kelly and Maggie finished 6th in Respondent Advocacy. CSULB's briefs averaged a 369.33 %. This was the best average in the nation.

Kelly and Maggie were the only team in the nation to qualify for the FRONT and finish among the top ten in written advocacy. On balance, weighing written and oral advocacy combined, this was the top performing team in the nation.

Summary:

This is CSULB's third title in five years (2021, 2022, and 2025). There is a term for this in competition: that word is dynasty. The fifth and seventh generations have achieved what only three other programs have been able to achieve. CSULB aims to extend that streak in the years to come.

Final Thoughts:

It is always bitter sweet to see a season end. I am proud of my mooters. As always, I am truly honored to have been entrusted with the role that I am fortunate enough to play in their development. I always go back to what an old friend of mine has told me through the years — what CSULB accomplishes year in and year out "would be a dream goal for most teams in the country."

That said, we lost some very close rounds this year. As we head into next season, I think my coaches, alums, students, and I feel, as we have at times in the past, that CSULB Moot Court has some unfinished business. The "unfinished business" tour will begin soon enough. But for now let's salute all our teams – especially our national award winners -- Ivonne and Kylie, Kelly and Maggie, and Shakhzoda and Jordan.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS

The 2024–2025 academic year builds upon the remarkable achievements of the previous year, propelling the CSULB Model United Nations (MUN) Program into a period of continued excellence and community impact. Through a combination of outstanding delegate performance and innovative leadership, the program has further solidified its reputation and expanded its reach.

CSULB's MUN team earned regional, national, and international recognition through a series of standout achievements at conferences:

In Spring 2025, our delegation participated in its first international conference since the COVID-19 hiatus at the North American MUN (NAMUN) Conference in Toronto, Canada. Representing the CSULB on a variety of committees—from the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change to several crisis committees tackling the complex "Balkan Puzzle" of early 20th-century Europe— our team showcased their skills on an international stage. Katherine Garcia-Guerrero, Emily Atherley, and Joshua Mims were recognized with well-deserved delegate awards for outstanding performance.

At the National MUN (NMUN) Conference in Washington, DC, in Fall 2024, our entire delegation received an Honorable Mention Award (3rd place), while four students representing Slovenia

at the UN General Assembly First Committee and Second Committee—Joshua Sheppard, Ava Johnson, Katherine Garcia-Guerrero, and Geumsong Noe—earned outstanding delegate awards.

In Spring 2024, the CSULB delegation, representing Moldova, once again earned an Honorable Mention at the NMUN Conference in New York, placing in the third-highest category out of over 300 competing colleges and universities.

At the Model United Nations of the Far West (MUNFW)
Conference in Spring 2024, CSULB students represented Brazil,
Saudi Arabia, and Guyana. The delegations for Brazil and
Guyana were awarded the prestigious Slanczka Achievement
Certificate for excellence in pre-conference materials, including
position papers and draft resolutions. Additionally, the Brazil
delegation was selected to speak at the Opening Plenary
Session, with Vice President Evan Stein delivering a regional
address on behalf of the Latin America and Caribbean group.

The MUN Program also demonstrated strong performance at regional conferences. At the R'MUN Conference hosted by UC Riverside and the Practice Academic Conference for Model UN (PACMUN) hosted by Riverside City College, CSULB students continued to shine. Ava Johnson received an Outstanding Delegate Award at PACMUN for her exceptional performance.

Last but not least, we hosted our inaugural BeachMUN
Conference, featuring three committees and welcoming over
100 delegates from CSULB, East Los Angeles College, Santa
Monica College, UC Irvine, and UC Riverside. The event
fostered a vibrant and lively intercollegiate collaboration among
campuses and helped raise the visibility of CSULB's Model UN
Program within the Southern California MUN circuit. Three
CSULB students—Ashton Ramos, Emiliano Molina, and Joshua
Sheppard—earned awards for their outstanding contributions.

Continuing our tradition of leadership and excellence, our program will play a pivotal role at the upcoming MUNFW conference in Spring 2025 by hosting two committees: the Commission on the Science and Technology of Development (CSTD) and the International Court of Justice (ICJ). Notably, we have been entrusted with hosting a simulation of the ICJ, a newly introduced committee at MUNFW. This opportunity is a particular honor and underscores the trust placed in our program's ability to manage and innovate within the framework of the conference.

In addition to participating at MUN conferences and successfully representing the CSULB at regional, national, and international conferences, the CSULB MUN program intends to assume more leadership positions and continue hosting intercollegiate Beach MUN conferences on our campus. In the world of MUN, it is a particular honor and privilege to chair committees and organize conferences. Building on the success of the inaugural BeachMUN conference, we are committed to expanding our reach and impact in future conferences.



For BeachMUN 2025, our goal is to engage an even broader group of participants, diversify the range of topics and committees offered, and continue to provide a platform where students can hone their skills in public speaking, negotiation, and international affairs. Ultimately, we aim to establish a strong and lasting presence in the Southern California MUN circuit, becoming a hub for innovation, collaboration, and leadership.

- DID YOU KNOW in 1998-99 Dr. Andrew Aldrin served as the CSULB MUN faculty advisor - he is the son of Apollo 11 astronaut Buzz Aldrin and he taught political science at CSULB on a part-time basis from 1997-2002.
- DID YOU KNOW In 1998, our CSULB MUN Program did a joint conference with Whitney High School MUN and instituted for the first time a "virtual" online component to the conference to simulate the sending and receiving of diplomatic cables using email.

LEGAL STUDIES

The Legal Studies Certificate program continues to be the preferred academic pathway for students who want to learn about law and legal systems in an interdisciplinary way. This year, Legal Studies students were accepted to a range of national and regional law schools, including the University of Michigan, the University of Texas, Gonzaga University, UCLA, UCI, Loyola, Chapman, and Southwestern. In October, the Legal Studies program hosted its sixth annual "First Monday Supreme Court Preview" (co-hosted by the CSULB Political Science Department and the CSULB Center for First Amendment Studies). The event consisted of a panel discussion by three CSULB legal experts: Dr. Jason Whitehead (Legal Studies Director and Political Science Professor), Dr. Kathryn Perkins



(Political Science Department Chair and Professor), and Dr. Kevin Johnson (Director of the Center for First Amendment Studies and Professor of Communication Studies). These experts previewed the major cases and issues on which the U.S. Supreme Court will be ruling in the 2024-25 term, including LGBTQ rights, labor rights, environmental protection, free speech, and more.



GENDER IN PUBLIC POLICY INTERNSHIP



Focusing on Gender in Public Policy, Dr. Maceyko and Dr. Perkins worked together to create this internship opportunity in the fall of 2024 as a multi-year partnership between the State Board of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) of California and the Department of Political Science (POSC) at California State University, Long Beach (CSULB). The internship was designed to provide students with an opportunity to engage in hands-on activities within a non-profit organization to gain experience in processes for advancing gender equity via public education and legislative action at the state-level in California. Currently, Dr. Maceyko serves on the AAUW of CA Board, and is an acting Director of Public Policy, so interns work directly with her on projects and initiatives.









Rohan Bhardwaj, a fourth-year Political Science major, has been creating public education materials and authoring support and opposition letters for California Senate and Assembly bills aligned with AAUW's legislative agenda. One key issue Rohan has been addressing is anti-transgender rhetoric. They developed an educational resource on transmisogyny to help inform individuals that discrimination against transgender people is not isolated, but interconnected with other forms of hate.

Marisol Carlos Herrero, a third-year Political Science major, has been representing AAUW in coalition meetings with like-minded, justice forward organizations, developing partnerships and furthering professional relationships with other associations. She has also been involved in policy agenda Public Policy Committee meetings, where she supported the committee in the selection of priority bills for AAUW's 2025 legislative agenda, centered on advancing gender equity bills and opposing anti-trans legislation.

BENJAMIN R. STOCKTON SCHOLARSHIP





Every year, two students are awarded the Benjamin R. Stockton Scholarship. This scholarship aims to alleviate the financial stress of students, allowing them to focus more on their studies. POSC alum Benjamin R. Stockton, known to most as Randy, shares his thoughts on the matter: "I developed an appreciation for people in the classroom, most of whom were comfortably middle-class, but scattered around there were others who had struggles at home, and had to work and earn their degree at the same time. I thought—Wow. That's a place where I can chip something in and help those folks cover their bills. Maybe they don't have to take that third shift at work. Maybe they can get that term paper turned in on time."

ANGELA MAIONE

Angela Maione is joining the Department of Political Science as an Assistant Professor. Originally from San Francisco, she majored in Political Science with a concentration in Political Theory at UCSD before going on to complete the PhD in Political Science at Northwestern University. This year she taught "Issues in Political Theory" POSC 225, "Classical Political Theory" POSC 301, and "Politics through Culture" POSC 395. In the Fall, she is looking forward to teaching "Feminist Political Theory" POSC 401, and a special topics seminar on "Political Theory of the People" POSC 497.

Prior to coming to CSULB, Dr. Maione taught in the Commonwealth Honors College at the University of

Massachusetts in Amherst and in Social Studies, an interdisciplinary honors program in the social sciences at Harvard University. She was also the inaugural Klemens von Klemperer Postdoctoral Fellow at the Hannah Arendt Center at Bard College. While a graduate student, she spent two years conducting predoctoral research through a Chateaubriand fellowship and an exchange with Sciences Po in Paris. Her teaching and research areas are in the history of political thought and contemporary democratic theory. She turns to underappreciated historical figures, including Mary Wollstonecraft, Rosa Luxemburg, and Hannah Arendt, for resources to respond to debates on populism, rights, socioeconomics, and gender politics. She has published articles in journals as *Theory & Event* and *Constellations* among others. Dr. Maione is currently working on a book project tentatively titled, "A Democratic Populism."

Debito Arudou Beamer (International Studies, Ph.D., Meiji Gakuin University) Just had his interview with author



M.G. Sheftall, "Japan's Kamikaze Suicide Pilots Exhibit at the USS Missouri in Honolulu", originally published in June 2015 by the Asia-Pacific Journal—Japan Focus, republished by Cambridge University Press in March 2025. Meanwhile, he is working on a full transition from studying East Asian Politics (his field

while working in Japan) to American Politics and the overall State of Democracy worldwide. Teaching 16.5 credits on two campuses this Spring and 22.5 credits last Fall on three campuses, he spends every waking moment focused upon what's going on in the Beltway and beyond. As US Democracy teeters under the current regime, he feels Political Science has become the study of a slow-motion revolution in progress, ample fodder for his monthly "Visible Minorities" column for the *Shingetsu News Agency*, and his blog on human rights issues since 1996 (www.debito.org). When school is out of session, he spends the hiatus in Canada with family or in Tokyo with his wife, a researcher in Japan on multiple government grants.

Mary Caputi (Political Theory; Ph.D., Cornell University)



Professor Caputi is co-editing a collection of essays with Amirhosein Khandizaji titled Revisiting Marcuse: Critical Reflections and New Perspectives, now under consideration at Palgrave. Her essay, "'Quiet Quitting' as Marcusean Refusal," is included in the collection. In May, she will give a paper, "Romantic Rebels

in an Authoritarian Age" at the 2025 Critical Theory Conference in Rome, Italy. A more detailed version of this essay is under consideration as a book proposal at Bloomsbury. At the American Political Science Association meetings in September, she will participate in a roundtable discussion of the book she co-edited with Patricia Moynagh, Edward Elgar's Research Handbook on Feminist Political Thought (2024). In addition to being involved in the Department's Political Theory Association, she continues to participate in CSULB's President's Commission on Sustainability. She will retire in May 2025 after thirty years in the Department of Political Science, and enjoyed every day of it!

Anand Commissiong (Political Theory; Ph.D., Rutgers University) Dr. Commissiong's current book-length project



entitled "Intersecting
Cosmopolitanisms" is under
contract with Lexington. It
examines the movements of
people and ideas between and
among the Caribbean and the
United States and seeks to
illuminate the mutual influences on
social and political movements and
social and political change.
Portions of the monograph have

been or will be presented at American Political Science Association, Association for Political Theory, Western Political Science Association, and the Caribbean Philosophical Association. Dr. Commissiong's scholarly articles include "The Target of Everybody's Fantasies': James Baldwin's Quare Race Consciousness" in *Theory & Event* (2023) and "Where is the Love? Race, self-exile, and a kind of homecoming," in *Diaspora* (2021). His chapter "Black Women and Human Emancipation: Sylvia Wynter, Angela Davis and the New Consciousness" was published in *Research Handbook of Feminist Political Thought* (2024). His article "The Will to Peace: Kant's and Nietzsche's Conceptions of History and Hope" is in progress.

Darin DeWitt (U.S. Politics; Ph.D., University of California, Los Angeles) has been conducting research in the interdisciplinary field of humor studies. With Dr. Nicole





Seymour (Professor of English at California State University, Fullerton), he published "Satirical Liberals and Superior Conservatives: The Asymmetry of Political Humor" in the Oxford Handbook of Screen Comedy. This has developed into a book project with Dr. Seymour titled "Conservative Camp." This project seeks to explain how

camp aesthetics, long associated with the political Left and with queer communities in particular, have been appropriated by figures on the Right. They have presented their initial findings at the annual conference of the National Women's Studies Association and the Critical Humor Studies Association.

Matthew Mendez Garcia (American Politics; Ph.D., University of Southern California) Dr. Mendez Garcia



research and teaching are in American politics, with a substantive focus on representation, legislative behavior, race and ethnicity, political behavior, intersectionality, and immigration.

Larry N. George (International Relations, Political Theory; Ph.D., Princeton University) Dr. George's research and



teaching are in International Politics, with a substantive focus on political theory, religion and political violence

Cora Goldstein (Comparative Politics; Ph.D., University of Chicago) Dr. Goldstein is beginning a project on

counterinsurgency warfare and just war theory that builds on her prior work on morality and urban war. She is enjoying her courses and her service as the Department's Graduate Coordinator.



Liesl Haas (Comparative Politics; Ph.D., University of North Carolina) Dr. Haas continues her research on the politics of

race/ethnicity within conservative religious spaces. Her article, "This One New Humanity: Can Multi-Ethnic Evangelical Churches Be Spaces for Racial Reconciliation?" (co-authored with Richard Haesly) is under review at *The Journal of Religion and Society*. She is currently working with Richard Haesly and Cathy Kim (CSULB MA student)



on a content analysis of sermons in multi-ethnic Evangelical churches following George Floyd's murder and subsequent conviction of Derek Chauvin. This project explores whether we see distinct patterns in the ways the national leadership in the Evangelical multi-ethnic church movement speaks about race and racial justice, depending on the race/ethnicity of the church leader.

Richard Haesly (Comparative Politics; Ph.D., University of North Carolina). Dr. Haas and I are completing an article based on content analysis of sermons from multi-ethnic Evangelical churches during summer 2020 to see if/how they discussed the murder of George Floyd and the attendant protests throughout that summer. I am also finishing a more theoretical article, "Contact, Empathy, Uptake, and Power in MEC Attempts at Racial Justice," which investigates the possibilities for and barriers to Evangelical churches being sites of sustained and meaningful racial reconciliation and





what lessons other organizations might learn from those attempts by organizations not known for tackling the challenge of racial reconciliation. In April, I gave a public talk to Seniors Patriots for Peace at Leisure World (Seal Beach) to discuss how to process and to prepare to take action in response to the Trump Administration's policies. I am

currently serving as Visiting Fellow for AP Comparative Government, reviewing the AP Comparative Government exam for rigor and appropriateness for college-level analysis of comparative government and politics.

Edgar Kaskla (Comparative Politics, Ph.D., UC Irvine). Completed a manuscript, *Left Turn*, which is a defense of



democracy. The original promised publisher turned the manuscript down. Dr. Kaskla continues his post as faculty advisor to the Political Science Students Association and writes extensively for a variety of Estonian newspapers and websites. Occasionally, he also publishes in English at Counterpunch.org.

Matt Lesenyie (American Politics; Ph.D., University of California, Davis) Dr. Lesenyie and co-author Blake



Yamamoto (CSULB Political Science class of 2023) published "Igniting Opinions: Understanding Public Knowledge on Fire, EMS, and Hybrid Engines" in the International Public Safety Association Journal. Their study found overwhelming support for purchasing hybrid-electric fire equipment, especially when

framed as a tool for preventing new brushfires. Dr. L collaborated with Taylor Miller (Class of 2025) to study attitudes about voter suppression in the southern US. They

found that attitudes toward recent election law reforms are highly polarized. However, using a framing experiment they demonstrated that about 20% of partisans will change their opinion of the laws depending on how the question is framed. Matt provided expert analysis on electoral politics appearing in more than 50 news stories this year.

Alex Lohman (Public Law; J.D., Northwestern University School of Law; BA, CSULB) Alex continues her work in civil

rights advocacy and compliance both as a lecturer in the department as the Associate Director for the Office of Prevention of Harassment and Discrimination at UC San Diego. She is thrilled to share in the success of her Moot Court students along with Dr. Ringel; a national championship in brief writing and amazing



performances in the national tournament! Additionally, Alex is proud of the MUN students who have performed so well at conferences throughout this year. CSULB MUN will be running a simulation of the International Court of Justice for the first time in many years at MUNFW. This is possible because of the amazing work of the MUN club leadership and the program's main faculty advisor, Dr. Yildiz. Go Beach!

Charles Mahoney (International Relations; Ph.D., University of California, Los Angeles) Dr. Mahoney's article "From

Mobilization to Annihilation: The Strategic Logics of Bioterrorism," was published in the journal Studies in Conflict & Terrorism. Dr. Mahoney also presented a paper titled "Corporate Innovation and War: Venture Capital and the U.S. Defense Industry," at the 2025 International Studies Association annual conference in Chicago.



Dr. Mahoney is currently working on several other projects including a book about the contemporary United States defense industry. Additionally, Dr. Mahoney is happy to report that over 40 POSC students enrolled in the Department's internship courses this semester. As the Department's

internship director, Dr. Mahoney is glad to see so many students earning course credit for their internship work.

Angela Maione (Political Theory; PhD., Northwestern University) presented a paper at the American Political



Science Association (APSA) annual meeting in Philadelphia this fall. In addition to that paper titled, "Arendt, Luxemburg, and the Republic," she continues to work on a book chapter on Arendt and Global Populism. She is looking forward to presenting her research and chairing a panel at the Western Political Science Association (WPSA)

next week. She is thrilled to be here and has been enjoying teaching several political theory courses during her first year at CSULB. She looks forward to teaching new courses next year, including, "Political Theory of the People."

Kathryn J. Perkins (Public Law; Ph.D., University of North Texas) Dr. Perkins presented her research at the Western



Political Science Association's (WPSA) annual meeting where she also began her service on the WPSA Executive Council. Her current projects include a co-authored paper with Sally Casanova Scholar and POSC B.A. and M.A. graduate Sierra Darwin on the U.S. Supreme Court and civil religion, a forthcoming special issue on

LGBTQ Politics for *Politics, Groups, and Identities* co-edited with Dr. Joanna Wuest (SUNY, Stony Brook), and her book manuscript on LGBTQ civil rights and the U.S. constitution. Dr. Perkins also gave several invited talks, including the keynote address for the inaugural transgender student wellness conference at CSULB. She served as the Chair of the LGBTQIA+ Campus Climate Committee, on the President's Commission on the Status of Women, and was honored to be selected as a member of

Cohort VI of the President and Provost's Leadership Fellows Program. She began her term as Chair of Political Science this year and is currently leading the department's ten-year strategic planning process - POSC 2035.

Amy Cabrera Rasmussen (American Politics; Ph.D., Yale University, MA and BA CSULB). After wrapping up her term

as department chair, Dr.
Cabrera Rasmussen was on
sabbatical during the Fall 2024
semester. She is very much
enjoying the return to teaching
in this Spring 2025 term. She
continues research and writing
on her new project: the
construction of "good work" in
the U.S. context—past, present,
and future. She has developed



a college-level course for students interested in careers in the public good and is participating in the Career Advocate program from the CSULB Career Development Center. She has also been publishing a Linked In newsletter entitled *Good Work* that is aimed at helping people translate their skills and knowledge into careers of impact that are also good for them. She looks forward to leading a workshop on "Reimagining political science education: supporting students' good work careers" at the Teaching & Learning Conference at the American Political Science Association annual meeting, to be held in Vancouver in September.

Lewis Ringel (Public Law; Ph.D., University of Maryland)

coaches CSULB's moot court teams and continues to chair the National Case Committee of the American Collegiate Moot Court Association (ACMA). In that capacity, he helped author the 2024-25 national case. In 2025, CSULB won the AMCA national championship for petitioner written advocacy and finished with the top written in the Nation.





Kevin Wallsten (American Politics; Ph.D., University of California, Berkeley) During the last year, Dr. Wallsten



carried out a large, nationally representative sample of the American public on questions connected to free speech and confidence in American institutions (including colleges and universities). The data from this project is being used as part of a book on free expression (co-authored with Jack Citrin of UC Berkeley). Additionally, he

presented his on-going research on military recruitment issues at Stanford University's Hoover Institution. Initial results from this research were subsequently reported in the New Yorker and Wall Street Journal.

Jason Whitehead (Public Law; Ph.D., University of Southern California, JD, Willamette University, BA, CSULB) continues to serve as the director of the Legal Studies



Certificate program, the campus pre-law advisor for the Law School Admission Council, and the faculty advisor for the Law Society. His new book, now titled "God's Constitution: Trump Era Christian Conservative Legal Narratives and American Democracy," is forthcoming from Palgrave Macmillan Press in late 2025.

The book analyzes the social, theological, and legal narratives that help explain why Christian conservatives have become increasingly hostile to liberal democratic constitutional values. In September, he fielded questions from students at a presidential debate watch party on campus, hosted by the Political Science Student Association. In October, he organized and co-hosted the Legal Studies program's 6th Annual Supreme Court Preview, where he and other panelists discussed the major issues and cases to be decided by the Supreme Court in its 2024-25 term.

Teresa Wright (Comparative Politics, Ph.D., University of California, Berkeley) In 2024-25, Dr. Wright has continued

to work on her book manuscript entitled, "Generations, Geography and Governance in China," which examines how the formative experiences of different generations of rural and urban Chinese citizens have shaped their political attitudes and behavior. She also wrote a book review of Anthony Spires' Global Civil Society and China for the China Journal.




Additionally, she reviewed articles for *Social Movement Studies*, the *Journal of Chinese Governance*, *Modern China, Government and Opposition*, and the *International Political Science Review*; and a grant proposal for the Hong Kong Research Grants Council. In March 2025, Dr. Wright attended the Association for Asian Studies conference, where she facilitated the initial meeting of The Society for the Social Science Study of China, funded by the Luce Foundation to promote the interdisciplinary study of China and develop best practices for teaching about China. At CSULB, she continues to enjoy working with students in the classroom, mentoring students pursuing independent research, and serving as the faculty advisor for the PSGSA. In June 2025 she is excited to travel to Japan, China, and Mongolia.

Ezgi Yildiz (International Relations, Ph.D., Geneva Graduate Institute)) continued to serve as the Director

of the Model United Nations
Program and was appointed
Assistant Director of the Global
Studies Institute. Her
monograph Between
Forbearance and Audacity: The
European Court of Human
Rights and the Norm against
Torture (Cambridge University
Press) received an Honorable
Mention for the Chadwick F.



Alger Award from the International Organization Section of the International Studies Association (ISA) in 2025. Her coauthored article, "The Defocalizing Effect of International Courts: Evidence from Maritime Delimitation" (with Umut Yüksel), published in The Review of International Organizations, won the inaugural Best Article on International Law and Social Science Award from the American Society of International Law's Interest Group on International Law and Social Science in 2025. In addition, Dr. Yildiz submitted two co-written journal articles for review: "International Courts and Selective Restraint in Times of Backlash" and "The Passports They Carry: Passport Inequality and Visa Barriers to Global South Scholars' Mobility." She is also preparing to submit her co-authored manuscript, Change in International Law: Paths, Processes, Power (with Nico Krisch and Pedro Esponda Martinez), to Oxford University Press for publication. Finally, Dr. Yildiz was re-elected as section co-chair of the European Society of International Law Interest Group on Social Sciences and International Law.

Dr. Mary Caputi is retiring from her role as professor of political science at California State University, Long Beach. During a distinguished career in academia and at Long Beach since 1995, Professor Caputi has been a dedicated teacher with a passion for political theory and feminist thought. She also held teaching positions internationally, including at John Cabot University in Rome and the University of Venice, Ca' Foscari. Her retirement marks the end of a remarkable career, leaving a lasting legacy of academic excellence and dedication to her students and colleagues.

Dr. Caputi's research focuses on feminist political thought, critical theory, and slow culture. She has authored several influential books and numerous scholarly articles, contributing significantly to her fields of study.

She has been especially passionate about helping students, particularly those struggling at school and personally. She has also inspired many to go on to explore subjects such as climate change and the slow movement and has been particularly heartened by those expressing interests in city planning or public policy to bring the humanity of slow cities back to the United States.



As Dr. Caputi embarks on her retirement, she leaves behind a legacy of academic excellence, significant research, and unwavering dedication to her students and colleagues. Her contributions will continue to inspire and influence the academic community for years to come.


