Community Engagement

Improving Student Success



Four FCS faculty participated in the Inclusive Excellence in Pedagogy Faculty Learning Communities (FLCs), which supported faculty in developing culturally responsive pedagogy and instructional methods. Dr. Tiffany Brown (CDFS) was a co-leader of the year-long initiative, alongside Dr. Lori Curci-Reed from the College of Education. This work aligns with the Chancellor's Office Equity Priority 5 initiative dedicated to promoting equitable learning practices with the goal of reducing high DFW rates and promoting a campus culture of evidence-based decisionmaking. Over the past year, I participated in the Faculty Learning Center sponsored series called Examining and Incorporating Inclusive Pedagogy in Higher Education. Throughout this series, I learned about the various ways to incorporate culturally responsive curriculum and teaching practices in my courses. Some of these practices we discussed were implicit biases and microaggressions in diversity and equity as well as ensuring accessible materials for students with disabilities. Some of the practices I have implemented this past semester based on the workshop series are allotting students a more creative opportunity to get to know each other in an asynchronous course by adding a poster presentation option in the about me discussion board as opposed to just a post with a picture. Students were excited at this opportunity and did both the poster as well as the discussion post and shared with me later that they felt this was a great way to get to know their classmates better. I had also included opportunities for students to meet me outside of the zoom office hours or requested individual appointments by creating a "Mixer" where students could come to a zoom session and meet me as well as other students in the class. While these sessions weren't highly attended due to scheduling (hence their enrollment in the asynchronous class), the students that did attend appreciated the opportunity to meet other students. I plan to continue exploring more ways to implement the strategies learned.

Several FCS faculty members participated in the 2023-2024 Inclusive Excellence in Pedagogy Faculty Learning Community. In monthly meetings, we learned about ways we can make our classrooms more inclusive in consideration of the many ways in which our students are diverse. My culminating project, which was presented in a poster session at the Anatol Center on May 23, 2024, focuses on approaches to making my Women and Aging: Lessons from the Golden Girls course more inclusive of issues facing diverse older women. I will implement these techniques when I teach the course again in Spring 2025. The most exciting part of the poster session event for me was sharing my project with Provost Scissum-Gunn and getting her feedback about how I could kick it up a notch! It was a fantastic experience and I thank the leaders (including our own Tiffany Brown) and colleagues from all over campus that shared their thoughts and ideas.


Dr. Simon Sum '08Director of Scientific Affairs
