INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The Long Beach Community Internship Program (LBCIP) establishes collaborations with Long Beach nonprofits to create a bridge for students back to their communities to work, live, and thrive. LBCIP increases the number of CSULB students who complete paid internships while providing opportunities for students to do meaningful work in their own neighborhoods, while they apply coursework to real world settings, hone professional skills, network, and explore local career options.

PROGRAM SPECIFICS

Students participating in the Long Beach Community Internship Program:

- >> Complete a minimum of 90 hours of work with Long Beach nonprofits, small businesses, and city departments
- >> Enroll in parallel internship courses that provide professional development and coaching
- >> Participate in program workshops and trainings
- Receive \$2,000 participation awards




