LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

This year, the Career Development Center continued its commitment to empowering students in their career journeys by expanding access to innovative tools, enriching campus employment, and deepening connections with employers and campus partners.

We introduced **AI-powered career tools** to support students in their job search, including **Jobscan** and **Big Interview**, which help students tailor their resumes and practice interview skills with confidence. These tools have enhanced our ability to meet students where they are and provide personalized career support.

We elevated the role of Beach Campus Employment by strengthening both Federal Work Study and Student Assistant opportunities. Our Supervisor Training: Cultivating Successful Student Assistants equipped campus supervisors with strategies to foster meaningful student employment experiences. We also hosted an end of year Division of Student Affairs Student Employee Celebration to recognize the career readiness skills students developed through their on-campus roles.

Our **Career Advocate Program** continues to thrive, with **48 faculty and staff** now having completed the program. These advocates are integrating career conversations into their work with students, helping to build a culture of career readiness across campus.

We enriched employer engagement through **Job Shadow Programs** and **Site Visits**, offering students firsthand exposure to workplace environments and

career pathways. We were also honored to receive the NASPA Excellence Award for our Equitable & Inclusive Hiring Practices Initiatives, a testament to our commitment to inclusive career development.

As we look ahead, we remain dedicated to creating career opportunities that are accessible, engaging, and transformative. We are grateful to our campus and employer partners for their continued collaboration and support in preparing students for the future of work.

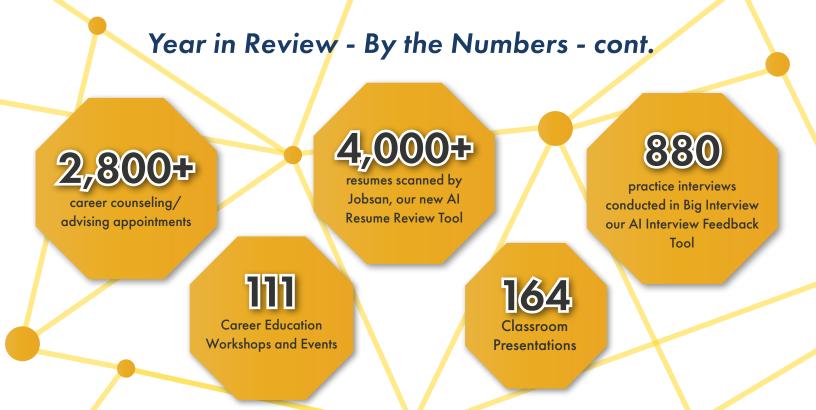

MAKING CAREERS ACCESSIBLE

Reverse Job Fair

The Learning Independence for Empowerment (LIFE) Project, in collaboration with the Career Development Center (CDC) and WorkAbility IV (WAIV) Program, conducted the three CSULB Reverse Job Fairs in conjunction with the Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 Job & Internship Fairs, and the Just-in-Time Fair. The LIFE Project provides comprehensive vocational, academic, and social opportunities for CSULB students with autism spectrum disabilities and other neurodivergent abilities. Current CSULB students and recent alumni who have disabilities participate in WAIV's career preparation program designed to assist in securing internships, developing employment skills, and retaining gainful employment.
