- **A course can only be used to satisfy one major requirement, with the exception of the Gender/Race/Ethnicity course, which may be double counted in the emphasis or breadth units.**
- Study of foreign language/literature strongly recommended.
- Students are strongly advised to see their History Department Advisor regularly to keep on top of their classes and to learn about internships, double-counting classes, and the Honors Program.
- HIST 301 must be taken in the first semester of upper-division course work in the major.
- Students will develop a portfolio (beginning with HIST 301) reflecting work in the History major. The portfolio will be evaluated as one of the requirements in the Senior Seminar (HIST 499). Students must complete 18 units of upper division work in the major.
- In addition to completing 45 units in the major, students pursuing Honors in HIST are required to take HIST 498H during the semester prior to taking HIST 499 and 6 units of additional Upper Division History courses in consultation with the Department Honors Advisor. Three of those units must come from a designated Applied History course, such as HIST 305 or 306 or 402.
- Students taking HIST 401, 450, or 476 should work with their History Department Advisor if intending to use any of these courses in a Field of Emphasis in which courses are not already approved.
- Only 3 units of HIST 485A or 485B may be applied to a field of concentration in U.S. History for the major
- **Students wishing to pursue the Social Science Credential in addition to the major must see a Social Science Credential advisor as many classes can count in the major, for GE, and for the credential.**
