Corporal Robbins received the CSULB Employee of the Year Award for Leadership!




Congratulations to all the 2022 graduates! Certificates of achievement and medallions were presented to Community Service Officers and Community Service Specialist graduates.

University Police Services Hosts Evacuation Shelter Exercise



On August 13th, 2022, the University Police Services hosted a half-day evacuation shelter exercise with the City of Long Beach, the American Red Cross, and the Governor's State Council on Developmental Disabilities.

Housing staff had the opportunity to learn shelter operations and to better prepare us for opening an evacuation shelter on campus in the event of a disaster. The exercise was staffed and ran like a real evacuation shelter, with volunteers acting out scenarios and shelter staff problem-solving in real-time. These training exercises allow us to work with our state and local partners and test our response plans in a safe and controlled environment before a real emergency occurs. Active Shooter Response Training Available

The University Police Services offers free 1.5-hour training for campus departments on the "RUN.HIDE.FIGHT." active shooter response model. This training also discusses national active shooter events, bystander intervention, and common warning sign behaviors. For those who are unable to devote the time needed to attend a full training, it is recommended that all members of the campus community refresh their knowledge by viewing the "RUN.HIDE.FIGHT." active shooter safety [video](#) at least once each semester.
