ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Tsiambwom M. Akuchu is a hip-hop and theatre artist whose work has been presented on stages like the Kennedy Center and Joe's Pub at The Public. He has been working for the past several years as a solo artist creating and performing new and established work, as well as performing in stage plays for festivals and shows like the DANCE NOW New York Festival, TEDx Providence, Big Sky Summer Theatre Festival, and the Atlanta Spring for Spring Festival. As an artist, his work fuses street dance forms and physical theatre leaning on his training with H+ Hip-Hop Dance Conservatory in New York as well as the D'Ell Arte International School of Physical Theatre and with Anne Bogart and SITI Comapny. Tsiambwom received his BA in Acting from Georgia Southern University and his MFA in Acting from the University of Montana. He is currently an Assistant Professor of Dance at CSULB.

Craig Martinson (composer, *buckets*) is a composer, producer, and multi-instrumentalist. His body of work includes 8 full length albums, 4 eps, a rock opera, commercial scores, podcast themes, and more. Before relocating to Long Beach, CA, he fronted the avant-garde garage glam band, Def.GRLS in Brooklyn, NY.

Santiago Rivera is a dance educator and choreographer in the Southern California area and is currently pursuing a MFA in Dance at California State University, Long Beach. He started dancing and training in the competitive world when he was in eighth grade. In 2016, he received his BA in Drama and minor in Educational Studies from the University of California, Irvine. In 2021, he received his Certification in Dance Instruction from Orange Coast College and completed the 2020/2021 José Limón Technique Certification Training Program. His works focus on equal opportunity for the Latinx and BIPOC Queer communities in "safe" dance spaces.

AJ Sharp is a dancer, choreographer, and dance educator with a BFA in dance from Oakland University who is currently pursuing her MFA in dance at CSULB. While living in NYC, AJ worked with artists such as Alexandra Beller, The Creators Collective, Cora Dance, The Equus Projects, The Physical Plant, Tamika Daniels, and The Median Movement. She was chosen for Doug Varone's Choreography Intensive, where she was mentored by Varone and premiered a new piece at 92Y. AJ founded SHARP dance collective in 2014 and presented works at Triskelion Arts, TADA Youth Theater, Bogart Gallery, LIC Arts, Spoke the Hub, Mark Morris Dance Theater, as well as flea markets, art galleries, and local pubs. AJ was the Guest Artist in Residence at Oakland University in 2019, where her dance was selected for the American College Dance Association. AJ is excited to continue teaching, performing, and creating at CSULB.

Katie Summers received her BFA in Dance Performance from the University of California, Irvine in 2017. Her undergraduate summers were spent with the American Dance Festival, San Francisco Conservatory of Dance, New Dialect, and Northwest Dance Project. Additionally, she received the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program grant to research site-specific improvisation in Italy under the guidance of Lisa Naugle, Ph.D. She has since danced with Redding City Dance Company, interned at Bethel Conservatory of the Arts, and attended Countertechnique workshops led by Charles Slender-White of Fact SF. Katie completed Studio du Corps' 450 Hour Pilates Teacher Training Program in 2019 under the guidance of Ron Fletcher Master Teacher, Diane Diefenderfer. Her research interests pertain to the correlation between her poetry-writing and her dance-making practices as well as her passion for the overall health of the dancing person and dance community: mind, body, and spirit. **Danzel Thompson-Stout**, a native of Allentown, PA is a performer, choreographer, and educator of Afro-American dance forms. With an embodied cultural history in street and club dance forms, Thompson-Stout commits to being an agent who brings authentic representation of these forms into the academy and broader dance field through his work. As an educator, he is currently an Assistant Professor of Dance at California State University, Long Beach, specializing in street, club, and African dance forms. As a performer, he has worked with several street dance artists such as Vince Johnson, Kyle Clark and Rennie Harris. Thompson-Stout is a principal dancer for Rennie Harris Puremovement, The Nance Dance Collective, and a guest performer for the Stella Maris Dance Ensemble of Kingston, JA. He is also one of the last generation of performers who has worked under Dr. Kariamu Welsh and holds a teaching certification in her contemporary African technique, "Umfundalai". Thompson-Stout holds a BFA in Dance from Temple University and an MFA in Dance from University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign.

Azuki Umeda is a Chapman University graduate, receiving her BFA in Dance Performance and BA in Integrated Educational Studies. She is currently attending CSU Long Beach to receive her MFA in Dance in 2023. She has worked both in the commercial and concert world of dance — recently she has worked with Paul Kirkland and Jason Young for Twenty-One Pilots' virtual concert as a dancer. In addition, she will be traveling to Italy this summer to work closely with Juliano Nunes for his upcoming intensive, Orsolina28. Azuki is the founder of her dance company, AU.THENTICITY. The company aims to create a collaborative environment for artistic exploration. Azuki is thrilled to present the first half of her larger thesis work tonight, as it will be fully premiered in spring 2023.
