H. Expected Outcomes:

Fieldwork in Adapted Physical Education (KIN 489A) offers three units of credit for candidates interested in gaining experience providing physical education to individual with disabilities. The experience is part of the required coursework for the Adapted Physical Education Added Authorization (APEAA) Credential. Candidates who are current SSPE, MS, and ES credential holders are required to complete 6 units of credit toward KIN 489A Fieldwork, as part of the California Teacher Credential APEAA program requirement.

Course Objectives:

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Plan, teach, analyze, and reflect a physical education lesson plan designed for individuals with disabilities using the CSULB KIN lesson plan template. Design and implement appropriate differentiated instructional strategies (universal design for learning -UDL) that include effective modifications and adaptations to meet the unique needs of individuals with various developmental, learning, sensory, orthopedic, neuromuscular, and severe disabilities.
- 2. Describe the various job roles and responsibilities of the APE teacher in order to effectively deliver quality services to students with disabilities in the public schools and community (i.e., direct service, consultation, and advocacy).
- 3. Identify and use appropriate visual and equipment/facilities and make the necessary accommodations and modifications to conduct a quality instructional program of adapted physical education for individuals with disabilities.





4. Students will gain a heightened sense of community, civic engagement, and personal responsibility, and/or a deeper understanding of issues of social justice, equity, and/or ethics relating to people with disabilities through school observations with assigned APE teacher.

J. Types of Assignments

Lesson Plan (total 15 points each; Total 30 Points) Due depending on letter assigned The purpose of the lesson plan is to organize and thoroughly explain the activities for the virtual practicum. Information should include general, behavioral objectives, preparation, skills/activities, methods, cues/skill modifications, and transitions. The lesson plan is evaluated on a rubric scoring system for each category. One lesson plan is taught for 30 minutes w/ assigned partner according to the ASAPP unit plan. Lesson plan drafts due two weeks prior to date of teaching to Dr. Bittner's email Melissa.Bittner@csulb.edu Dr. Bittner will provide feedback in track changes. Students will continue to re-submit (CLEAN COPY- no track changes) until approval to teach (BOTH visuals and lesson plan). Final copy submitted to BeachBoard by midnight on date of teaching.

APE Hours (total 50 points) Due Dec 9

Students will accumulate 50 APE hours from a variety of settings. Options include:

- ASAPP Virtual Teaching (6 hours). ALL students enrolled in KIN 489A.
- ASAPP Face-to-face (F2F). This is REQUIRED for APE students who do not have a credential. NO EXCEPTIONS. (12 hours)
- Observe APE teacher/s in the field. (remaining hours)

<u>Do-It-Yourself (DIY) Equipment & Activity Video (total 15 points)</u> Due Nov 9 Students will create DIY home equipment for children to use for APE. Then, students will make a universally designed activity that corresponds with the DIY equipment. Students will submit a short video of their DIY equipment and activity.

All assignments must be typed and submitted on the prescribed due date **before midnight** and will be graded on content and grammar.

Late course work: Assignments submitted after the prescribed due date will result in the following grade deduction:

- First late assignment = -20%. Last day to submit late materials is the last class date (excluding final exam).
- NO other late assignments will be accepted after the first "buddy pass" (i.e., late assignment accepted with 20% deduction)

Instructor's Interpretation of the University's Withdrawal Policy

It is the student's responsibility to withdraw from classes. Instructors have no obligation to withdraw students who do not attend courses and may choose not to do so. Withdrawal from a course after that date requires the signature of the instructor and the department chair and is permissible only for serious and compelling reasons. [Severe or extensive medical problems would be a reason to drop after that date, but fear of receiving a final grade lower than desired, or change in one's work schedule are not \ considered a serious and compelling reasons.] A "W" will appear on the student's





transcript.

During the final three weeks of instruction withdrawals are not permitted except in cases such as accident or serious illness where the circumstances causing the withdrawal are clearly beyond the student's control. The cause must be documented. Ordinarily, withdrawals in this category involve total withdrawal from the university. You will need the approval of the college dean as well as that of the class instructor and the department chairperson for each class you drop.

ATTENDANCE IS VERY STRONGLY RECOMMENDED. Experience has shown that good grades are strongly correlated with attendance, practice and participation.

- 1. Absences **DO NOT** exempt students from academic requirements.
- 2. An "Incomplete Grade" may be granted if the student has a passing grade, but only if the instructor determines that it is feasible for the student to successfully complete remaining assignments after the semester. Pursuant to university policy, such determinations are within the discretion of the instructor.
- 3. Make-up Policy: Students that are participating in school sponsored events (e.g., athletics, professional conferences, academics) need to turn in/complete assignments and readiness assessments tests AHEAD of time or by the due date. Make-up assignments will be determined case-by-case. If unable to participate during class due to illness or injury, an alternative in-class activity option will be given by the instructor. O. Deadlines

All assignments must be submitted the day they are due by midnight. Assignments are to be submitted through (a) BeachBoard Discussion Board AND (b) hard copy WITH the rubric. All assignments must be typed and submitted on the prescribed due date and will be graded on content and grammar. Late course work: Assignments submitted after the prescribed due date will result in the following grade deduction, one week or less 10%, more than a week 20%. After the last day of class, no work will be accepted. It is your responsibility to save, print and submit assignments on time. There is NO extension for extra credit.

R. Sample Cheating and Plagiarism Policy

- **Plagiarism** occurs when a student obtains someone else's work and presents those ideas or words as her or his own academic work.

- Fabrication occurs when a student makes up data or results and records or reports them.
- **Falsification** occurs when a student manipulates research materials, equipment, or processes or changes or omits results such that the research is not accurately reflected in the research record.
- Falsifying academic records includes, but is not limited to, altering grades or other academic records.

Furthermore, students should be aware that faculty members have a range of academic actions available to them in cases of cheating and plagiarism from arranging a conference, to failing a student on that particular work, to failing a student in a course, to referring the case to judicial affairs.
