#### Chair's Report Kristin Bonetati:

- -No budget news at this time, though we know the budget will be bad and have been told to anticipate further cuts
  - -COVID-related, looking at more efficient testing methods
- -As of Monday, have had 79 cases overall since the outbreak. Some students in quarantine, awaiting test results for them
- -Continue to loan out computers and provide hotspots for Wifi—if students need technological assistance or devices, they'll want to reach out to Student Affairs to ask for help
- -Announcements went out yesterday on the spring 2021 semester remaining primarily remote for the semester from the CSU Chancellor and President Conoley

#### Questions:

Q: Any information on how the Music school is handling students who cannot attend in-person classes? Or Athletics?

A: It's in the College of the Arts where the most creative solutions have occurred. Students are still able to get practice in, even if it is not ideal that classes aren't in person—no major complaints so far

- -Regarding athletes, they are disappointed in not being able to compete or engage in fitness activities until there's a safe way to do it. Can be difficult to keep the athletes separate at this time, but they are having various support resources available for their academics
- -Biggest problem regarding remote learning is that many students don't have a stable home learning environment, but our campus is doing what it can to promote a positive learning environment throughout campus to provide WIFI or other means for students to keep learning if it's hard to do so at home
- Q: People are thinking that the students shouldn't be paying the full cost of tuition while students aren't on campus. How do we make people understand that the university still is running as usual even without it being populated?
- A: Buildings and other infrastructure that are open and being utilized are very expensive. CARES money is being used to cover some of the costs, but it is a one-time funding measure. It is complicated when it comes to fees & other payments—for example, some students thought paying the SRWC fee was about gym memberships, but it's about building maintenance and keeping student-run infrastructure functioning for the future
- Q: Can you please comment on the staff layoffs at SFSU that have been concerning to our CSULB staff?

A: While there have been layoffs in the auxiliaries at CSULB, our enrollments are strong and we have not been as hard-hit as other CSU's in the system—we still need folks in student services and instruction

Q: Any updates on the mandatory flu shots for staff that had been discussed?

A: Flu shots are encouraged, but <u>not</u> mandatory or required to come to campus per various discussions that were held in the CSU

Q: Is the campus considering the early buy-out?

A: We have not considered it yet; it is being considered by campuses that have experienced an enrollment decline—but it is not off the table. Not philosophically against it, but it does not bring us an advantage currently

Q: Have they considered outdoor teaching minus the possible rain? But possibly under canopies and distanced?

A: Yes, this is being taken under consideration for perhaps next summer—though this does bring problems related to technology and other means our faculty may rely on. Considering all alternatives because the situation is fluid with COVID
