See slide (Base Budget Uses) for earmarked items. These are mandated/tracked expenses from the State budget or Chancellor's office, such as grants, fee-based programs. From Andreas, what were the cuts (2021)? Just over 19 million (5% budget cut to all divisions). Almost all has been restored. From Kevin, how do allocations work?
